Ø **<u>REQUIREMENT</u>**: As the Exit Exam is a requirement for graduation, students must take this exam to receive their diploma.

**Exit Exam Testing Windows:** The exit exam will be administered continuously throughout each semester. In order to graduate in the:

<u>Spring</u> or <u>Summer</u> Intersession semesters, the exam must be completed by the last working day in **April**. For the <u>Fall</u> or <u>Winter</u> Intersession semesters, the exam must be completed by the last working day in **November**. For the <u>Summer</u> semester, the exam must be completed by the last working day in **July**.

## ETS Proficiency Profile (EPP)

Students completing the Associate of Arts (AA), Associate of Fine Arts (AFA), Associate of Science (AS) and the Nursing RN program will complete the ETS Proficiency Profile (EPP).

The EPP assesses general education in four core skill areas reading, writing, mathematics and critical thinking. Students can earn a digital certificate (three levels of proficiency) based upon their test scores.

Students can then list these credentials on a job resume.

The test will take approximately <u>2 hours</u> to complete, and students will receive their scores immediately after testing.

## WorkKeys Exit Exam (WKeys) – Must be completed at the Hillsboro or Arnold Testing Centers.
